<p>Contents</p> <p>The aim of the module is to expand existing basic skills in empirical methods. To do this, on the one hand the scientific theoretical basics of empirical research are discussed, with a special focus on epistemological problems as they can be found in different research approaches and different schools of thought, such as the so-called "quantitative" and "qualitative" research. Throughout the whole sub-module, an integrative viewpoint is adopted, i.e. the point of view that successful research in social sciences requires knowledge and understanding that relate to both research traditions.</p> <p>Qualification Objectives</p> <p>The students get to know the prevailing approaches in the theory of science and in research design, can evaluate them regarding specific research questions, and apply them in their own research. The students understand the different methodological approaches of social research and can apply them to their own research questions.</p>

<p>Contents</p> <p>The module teaches students the fundamentals of the law of nations and the working methods of international organizations, with a special focus on the legal framework conditions.</p> <p>The sub-module "Economics" focuses on:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> the interaction between politics, economics, and civil society in the age of globalization; governance and control of government action under the condition of international economic interdependency; inter- and transnational trade, monetary, and fiscal policy (tough policies); inter- and transnational labor, social, and environmental policy (soft policies); international regimes and inter- and transnational institutions. <p>Qualification Objectives</p> <p>The students</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> know the different sources of the law of nations; get an overview of the legal relationships of the nation states; know the different origins and the relationship between the law of nations and domestic law; get to know the intellectual background of international political economics and are thus able to classify current public and political debates against this background and to critically reflect on them accordingly. <p>The students broaden their understanding of the complex interplay between "evolutionary" and mostly uncontrolled developing structures, governance, and the role of ideas - such as the one of free trade - that leave their mark on reality.</p>

<p>Contents</p> <p>This course provides an overview of the theoretical and conceptual basics for the analysis of organizational structures and decision-making processes in the political-administrative system. The range of the offered explanatory approaches and patterns of interpretation covers the classical, actor-centered, and structuralistic theories, different variations of modern institutional theory, and system theoretical observations of political and social governance.</p> <p>Qualification Objectives</p> <p>The students are enabled a) to analyze and critically compare prevailing explanatory approaches in modern theories of state and of administration, b) to critically reflect on and classify empirical decision-making processes and reform projects against the background of theoretical analytical approaches, c) to reasonably apply the descriptive and prescriptive dimensions of the theories in the context of current international state and administrative reforms. The overall aim is to promote the students' skills in critical analysis, and their ability to communicate both in writing and orally.</p> <p>Main expected outcomes are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> the ability to summarize even complex texts concisely and to document the respective learning contents; the ability to understand exemplary institutions and working methods of governance, and to present them comprehensibly by means of literature search, discourse, and analysis; the ability to understand, evaluate, and present basic concepts and theoretical components of governance; the ability to adequately and briefly present the practical relevance of the analysis of institutions of global economics and further global functional systems; the ability to formulate and justify smaller development and research projects in the area of global economics /global governance.

<p>Contents</p> <p>The students receive an introduction to the theory of social systems as a sociological system theory. The focus of the course is on the explanation and discussion of basic paradigms, concepts, models, and terms of modern sociological system theory. In a first part, the focus is on the terms of communication, complexity, and contingency.</p> <p>A second focus is on the development of a basic understanding of the strengths and weaknesses of systemic thought. This is supported by an elementary comparison of theories, especially including the theory of action and phenomenology. The comparison of theories becomes more concrete by using the practical problem of system control.</p> <p>A third focus addresses the topic of the political system of modern societies. This is on the one hand the connection to classes on political theory, on the other hand the political system serves as a pars pro toto of an autonomous, differentiated functional system of society. Functional differentiation as a central structural model of modern societies is exemplified using the way the political system works.</p> <p>Qualification Objectives</p> <p>The students gain:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> the ability to critically analyze and evaluate theoretical texts; the ability to concisely summarize even complex texts, to document respective learning contents, as well as the ability to understand exemplary aspects of systemic thought and to present them comprehensibly by means of literature search, discourse, and analysis; the ability to understand, evaluate, and present basic terms and architectonic decisions of the theory of social systems, as well as the ability to briefly present the practical relevance of systemic thought for professions of system control. <p>The students gain in-depth knowledge of the following topics:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> network theories (sociological) expansions: socio-economic network theories

<p>Contents</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> theory of public goods; economic theory of the forms of government "democracy" and "autocracy" (dictatorship); theories of the wealth and prosperity of nations; economic reasons for state functions: theory of merit goods; hybrid goods (in the context of state services / private services / collective services); global public goods (including distribution and redistribution theories); critical analyses and alternative concepts (mixed goods, complex goods), as well as constitutional economics; theories of the state; the "ideal" extent of the production of public goods; "just" financing. <p>Qualification Objectives</p> <p>The aim of the module is the analysis of central issues of modern welfare states, their dynamics, and their transformation.</p> <p>The students get to know the concept both in a differentiated way and in the scope of its possible applications. They expand their understanding of different institutional arrangements and their respective suitability to provide certain goods. By dealing with the problem of public goods the students expand their understanding of specific conditions of production and the decision-making structures in the arenas of the market and the state. This also increases the sensitivity towards the legitimization of government actions or their limits, respectively.</p>

<p>Contents</p> <p>The former disciplinary borderline between business, politics, administration, and culture is disappearing more and more, and interdisciplinarity is increasingly gaining in importance. Information and communication technologies as drivers of these changes are more and more relevant in management-oriented political and administrative sciences. This module teaches the students advanced knowledge of information sciences for administration and of business informatics, using selected areas where modern information and communication technologies are used in the public sector.</p> <p>This module is to expand already existing knowledge and to strengthen the understanding of new technologies. The aim is to teach the students the relevance and the possibilities of the application of information technologies for the modernization, organization, and processes of administration.</p> <p>Qualification Objectives</p> <p>The students gain insight into the current concepts, models, and tools of information sciences for administration, and learn the possibilities of their application in politics and administration. Thus they are to become able to prepare and make strategic decisions on the introduction of new technologies. The programming of computers and networks is not part of the module.</p>

<p>Content</p> <p>The module "Research Project" addresses students with a pronounced interest in academic work and research-oriented professional fields. It offers students the chance to realize – academically supported – a research-oriented project at a ZU chair, a research cluster, research association, or research center. In the course of their project the students write an academic paper as a report on their project. This written examination is an independently prepared academic work in which students apply academic methods and findings to a concrete research topic. A ZU professor supervises this project and agrees to the research question and the applied methods. The results are put down in writing and submitted together with the registration for the Humboldt Year. Project progress, potential problems in working on the project, and possible solutions are discussed in the related research colloquium. The contents and methods required to work on the project are taught in the context of a seminar.</p>				

Qualification Objectives

This module trains the students in independent work and teaches advanced knowledge in scientific working. The students learn to deal with a topic on an academic level over a whole year.
